### MEETING

#### MINUTES

Members present by Roll Call: Ted Van Kempen (Hubbard), Ann Marcotte (Aitkin) Steve Barrows (Crow Wing), Davin Tinquist (Itasca), Scott Bruns (Cass), Mike Wilson (Morrison), Dean Newland (Clearwater) Craig Gaasvig (Beltrami), and Tim Terrill (Executive Director).

Pledge of Allegiance

Chair Marcotte asked if there were any additions to the agenda. None offered. M/S (Wilson/Barrows) to approve of the agenda. Motion carried unanimously.

M/S (Wilson/Barrows) to approve of the Consent agenda. Motion carried unanimously.

#### Correspondence

Comm. Marcotte mentioned that she saw the article in the Grand Rapids Herald. Comm. Van Kempen later texted that he receives various Hubbard and Bemidji papers and he saw the press release in one of those papers.

#### **Planning and Zoning**

**Ca11a21 Sobolik Variance-** Jeff Woodford, deputy director, introduced Stephanie Sobolik and let her provide a brief overview of the variance request. Following her remarks, Jeff provided the board with the conditions and findings of fact to allow a permanent structure to have an addition added that is 47' from the Miss. river, and to allow a temporary home. Discussion ensued and Comm. Gaasvig noted that #1 on the findings of fact sheet was not checked and could possibly be due to an oversight. Jeff explained that the landowner fill out that portion of the sheet. Clarification was sought by different board members on location of house and placement of buildings. **M/S (Gaasvig/Tinquist) to certify the variance. Motion carried unanimously.** 

**M11a21 Kruschek Variance-** Amy Kowalzek from Morrison county discussed the variance to allow a deck to be removed from the property and be replaced with an expanded bedroom. Amy stated that the footprint would remain the same and that the South side of the home meets setback requirements. Comm. Marcotte asked for clarification on where the bedroom would be, and Amy showed pictures from the agenda packet the location of the bedroom expansion. Comm. Gaasvig brought up that since it was not increasing impervious and that it was building in the same footprint that it is follows are plan. **M/S (Gaasvig/Wilson) to certify the** 

variance. Motion carried unanimously. Discussion from Comm. Marcotte was brought up that it was mentioned in the BOA minutes that the MHB board doesn't turn down many applications and she thought that it didn't give a good impression. Comm. Wilson said that he saw who said that staement and doesn't agree. Comm. Gaasvig stated that since the MHB works with the counties, that by the time the variance reaches the MHB, the county has done a good job with following our plan. Discussion ensued about training for BOA members, and various options are available at the county and state level.

#### Action/Discussion:

- Biennial Conference- Tim asked what Commissioners thought about the biennial conference and lead with the video and award presentation really set a good tone for the meeting. Ann liked the presentation and thought Paula did a good job. Would like to have introductions at the next meeting. Comm. Tinquist stated that he had another Itasca commissioner attend and that he really learned something that changed his viewpoint on the MHB and what we do. Comm. Barrows said he talked with attendees and Todd Holman and it was very complimentary. All Commissioners thought it went well in representing the MHB.
- 2. Board Planning date- Tim asked if the board was interested in rescheduling a board retreat. Board members asked what would be the main purpose for it, and Tim stated that it would get a chance for Comm. to bring ideas to him and discuss things. While the board agreed that it is good to discuss things so they can be of one mind before issues become heated or contentious; they thought that things are going well now in the direction they are going. Also comm. stated that they are overwhelmed with issues right now. Through consensus it was decided not to have on in the following year.
- 3. Cultural Resource inventory grant- Jeremy Nienow is an archaeologist that presented an opportunity to the board to conduct a cultural resources study on the first 400 miles of the Miss. river to build a visual database of the cultural resources using ArcGIS platform. The presentation was based off his Camp Ripley study and he showed what could be offered to the MHB. After the presentation, Tim showed how historical societies, planning and zoning, and native American tribes could use the data. While the board thought the information was helpful, some didn't see the value of creating a database and then giving it away to other entities. Others thought that this might be something that the state should do and not the MHB. Comm. Wilson stated that we need more information before he could make a decision and the board agreed and asked for more information at a later date.

#### **Executive Directors Report**

- 1. Tim stated that John Jaschke was impressed by our conference and sent emails to the BWSR staff aying that we have a good strategy to establish protection through the legacy dollars.
- 2. Tim said that he is working with Megan Christianson to develop a Resourcetaiment project through the United Way.
- 3. Held meeting with Bowlen lodge and Pete Stauber's office and things are going well for a land exchange.

County Updates: Davin said that Itasca county is moving forward with the \$75 million dollar jail and the footings are in. He also stated that HEW needs approval from Cohasset to move forward and approve the building of their new facility. Ann stated that she read a pamphlet about Chronic Wasting Disease and where it is at in MN. She is very concerned about it.

#### M/S (Marcotte/Newland) to adjourn. Motion carried unanimously.

#### Mississippi Headwaters Board Holds Successful Biennial Conference in October

The Mississippi Headwaters Board (MHB) held a biennial conference to show elected officials and agency personnel the conservation work that the MHB and partners worked on over the past few years.

Dept. of Natural Resources Assistant Commissioner Bob Meier opened the meeting with a few words about partnering and working together on conservation

First on the agenda was a Living History of the Mississippi Headwaters Board video that described the formation and history of the MHB. The video provided the group with a historical perspective on what the organization has done over the past forty years, and can be viewed on the MHB homepage at <a href="https://www.mississippiheadwaters.org/">https://www.mississippiheadwaters.org/</a> After the video, an award was presented by Senator Carrie Ruud to Bob Lessard for his pioneering work on forming the MHB.

Following the award presentation was various topics regarding conservation activities implemented on the Mississippi river. It was announced that over the past five years, the MHB has received over \$15 million dollars to help conserve land in its natural environment through an easement and acquisition program made possible by funding from the Outdoor Heritage Council fund as a part of the Clean Water Land and Legacy Fund. Another activity presented was the Minnesota Traditions social media campaign which utilizes Facebook and Twitter to spread positive messaging on how Minnesota is working to protect our lakes, rivers, and streams from zebra mussels and other invaders. Over 359,000 people were reached through a targeted 2021 campaign, and data showed that video content reached almost as many non-followers as it did followers.

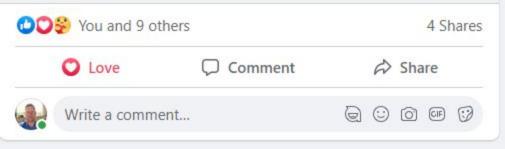

- And it speaks to our cultural heritage, the inspiration for countless stories and songs that weave through the fabric of America.

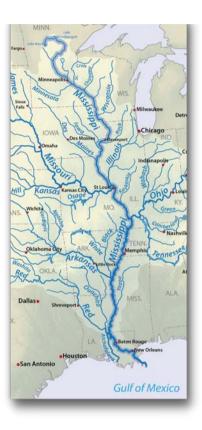
But it is also a river at risk on many fronts, facing severe ecological decline.

# **RESTORING AMERICA'S RIVER**

We need a federal Mississippi River initiative.



As we have with other treasured, critical waterways—the Great Lakes, Chesapeake Bay, and the Everglades—it's time to establish a national coordination effort and direct federal funding to support local initiatives that will restore America's River and build resilience for the communities that depend on it.



# A CRITICAL INVESTMENT

Modeled on the successful Great Lakes Restoration Initiative, the Mississippi River Restoration & Resilience Initiative (MRRRI) would provide the framework, funding, and focus to protect America's River.

MRRRI directs the Environmental Protection Agency to consult and collaborate with other agencies, states, tribal nations, and local governments as well as non-governmental organizations to develop and coordinate the initiative. A regularly updated action plan, developed with public input, will guide the implementation of MRRRI and the use of federal funds in order to:

- Protect our drinking water, wildlife, and river-dependent industries by **reducing runoff pollution**
- Reduce flood and storm risks and **increase community resilience** through ecologically sound management
- Protect and **restore wildlife habitat**, including by preventing the spread of aquatic invasive species

MRRRI will provide grants for restoration projects in mainstem river states, cities, townships, and tribal nations while prioritizing our most at-risk communities. The projects and activities funded by MRRI would complement and build upon existing federal and state programs to ensure the Mississippi is a healthy working river for generations to come.

For our communities, wildlife, and economy, we need to fill this clear gap in our nation's regional waterway restoration programs. It's time to create a federal Mississippi River Restoration & Resilience Initiative (MRRRI).

## THE COST OF INACTION

Without MRRRI's investments, so much would remain at risk: our economy, wildlife, recreational opportunities, and ever-rising costs to keep our communities safe and our drinking water clean.

- Unable to absorb floodwaters or build wetlands, today's Mississippi makes riverfront communities more vulnerable to floods, hurricanes and other storms. Damages to main-stem states from the historic 2019 floods alone cost \$6.2 billion\*.
- Excess nitrates flow into the river and its tributaries creating a dead zone in the Gulf of Mexico, costing our seafood and tourism industries at least **\$82 million** a year.
- Habitat loss and invasive aquatic species threaten the river and gulf's wildlife, fisheries and recreational opportunities and the nearly **700,000 jobs** that these natural resources support.
- Water utilities up and down the river face substantially increasing financial burdens. Just one mid-sized plant to reduce nitrate pollution costs around \$10-15 million.

Communities of color, Indigenous, rural and low-income communities along the river disproportionately bear these costs. Existing federal programs lack sufficient coordination and partnerships to address these challenges and shared responsibility.





### Congresswoman Betty McCollum (MN-04) Legislative Summary: Mississippi River Restoration & Resilience Initiative (MRRRI) Act of 2021 (2-pager)

Section 1: SHORT TITLE

#### Section 2: MISSISSIPPI RIVER RESTORATION & RESILIENCE INITIATIVE

- (A) **Mississippi River findings**: This finding section includes (13) findings of the current issues and challenges facing the Mississippi River corridor. This serves to justify the need for MRRRI.
- (B) **Purpose of MRRRI**: A brief summary of what is envisioned in MRRRI. More detail on each of these items follows in the rest of the bill.
- (C) Definitions: Definitions (11) that clarify specific terms used throughout the legislation.

#### (D) Mississippi River Restoration & Resilience Initiative

This paragraph establishes MRRRI as one of the Geographic Programs within the Environmental Protection Agency, alongside the Great Lakes Restoration and other systemic approaches to protecting and restoring major waterways

- (i) Establishment: The US EPA is instructed to establish the Mississippi River Restoration & Resilience Initiative to advance the goals of systemic, large-scale restoration of the Mississippi River Corridor.
- (ii) **Focus Areas**: MRRRI funds are eligible for investments in four main focus areas:
  - a) <u>Water quality</u>: Improve drinking water quality in the Mississippi River States and water quality throughout the Mississippi River Corridor, and by reducing the amount of polluted runoff, excess agricultural nutrients, and sediment entering the Corridor and improving source water protections.
  - b) <u>Natural Infrastructure</u>: Improve community resilience by restoring the ability of the Mississippi River and its floodplain, riverine wetlands, delta and coastal wetlands, and backwaters to minimize and ameliorate flood and storm risks.
  - c) <u>River Corridor Habitat</u>: Protect & restore habitat in and along the river Corridor.
  - d) Aquatic Invasive Species (AIS): Prevent the spread of AIS in the Corridor.
- (iii) **Prioritization**: MRRRI will prioritize investments in activities that assist communities of color and economically disadvantaged urban and rural communities in addressing disproportionate impacts caused by the ecological degradation of the Mississippi River and its tributaries.
- (iv) Project selection criteria: The US EPA will collaborate with federal and non-Federal partners to select the best combination of MRRRI investments. Criteria include measurable outcomes, impact on the river, feasibility and opportunity for coordination & collaboration.
- (v) **Implementation**: This item details the specific types of activities eligible for MRRRI funding in the focus areas, addresses associated matching fund requirements.
- (E) Establishing the EPA Mississippi River Program Office: This item establishes a new EPA Mississippi River office. The Mississippi River office will be lead by a Director and charged with implementing the responsibilities described in this legislation, including: conducting intra-agency coordination, regularly updating the Action Plan & Science Plan (see below), evaluating program effectiveness, coordinating and consulting with state and local stakeholders, providing regular updates to Congress and the public.
- (F) **Mississippi River Corridor Research Centers:** This section establishes an NCRS Mississippi River Corridor Research Center, and three regional research centers to be located in St. Paul, St. Louis and Baton Rouge.

The Mississippi River Corridor Research Centers and regional centers will conduct relevant river research and consult with stakeholders, state and local governments, and other federal agencies in accordance with the MRRRI Science Plan (see below).

- (G) Actionable Goals & Action Plans: This section defines the process of developing three initial MRRRI deliverables: MRRRI goals, MRRRI Action Plan and the MRRRI Science Plan. This section also requires the EPA to consult with Federal and non-Federal entities throughout this work and provide regular updates to the public and Congress.
  - (i) Actionable Goals: Within 1 year, the US EPA must develop actionable goals and measurable success criteria for MRRRI in consultation with river stakeholders. These goals and success criteria must be updated not less than every 5 years along with the Action Plan and Science Plan (see below).
  - (ii) The Action Plan: The MRRRI Action Plan is the first major step in identifying and advancing MRRRI implementation. The plan will be developed in close consultation with a diverse range of river stakeholders, and will serve as a rolling 5-year strategic plan for MRRRI. It identifies priority MRRRI programmatic investments and activities during that period. The plan is to be updated every 5 years with input from a broad range of stakeholders.
  - (iii) The Science Plan: This section defines the process developing and regularly updating the Mississippi River Science Plan. Led by the USGS, this work includes a preliminary Mississippi River Science Forum followed by creation of a regularly updated Science Plan that identifies and prioritizes river research needs & opportunities. The plan is to be updated every 5 years.
- (H) **Use of Funds:** This item specifies eligible uses for MRRRI funds, clarifies may be used, legal requirements and types of expenditures that are excluded.
  - (i) **Eligible recipients** (Transfer of funds): MRRRI funding can be made available to (i) Federal agencies, as well as (ii) non-Federal agencies including states, tribal organizations, local governments, NGOs, institutions of higher education and individuals.
  - (ii) **Availability of funds prior to Action Plan development**: While the Action Plan is under development, initial MRRRI funding can be used for research or implementation compatible with the objectives in Section 2, Item (d) above, and to establish the research centers.
  - (iii) Availability of funds for projects not in the Action Plan: A small portion of MRRRI funds (not more than 5%) will be set aside for competitive grants to non-Federal entities. This funding is primarily to address the impacts of natural disasters and respond to emerging threats that are compatible with MRRRI goals but not specified in the Action Plan.
- (I) Activities by Other Federal Agencies: This section details the other federal agencies that will engage with the EPA through MRRRI. The specific sister agency leaders include Chief of the Army Corps of Engineers (ACOE), Director of the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service (USFWS); Chief of the Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS); Chief of the Forest Service (USFS), the Director of the U.S. Geological Survey (USGS); Director of the National Park Service (NPS); Administrator of the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA); Administrator of the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration (NOAA); Commandant of the Coast Guard (USCG).
- (J & K) Budget & Appropriations: These items define the budget and appropriations process for MRRRI, and will specify an annual budget request.
